

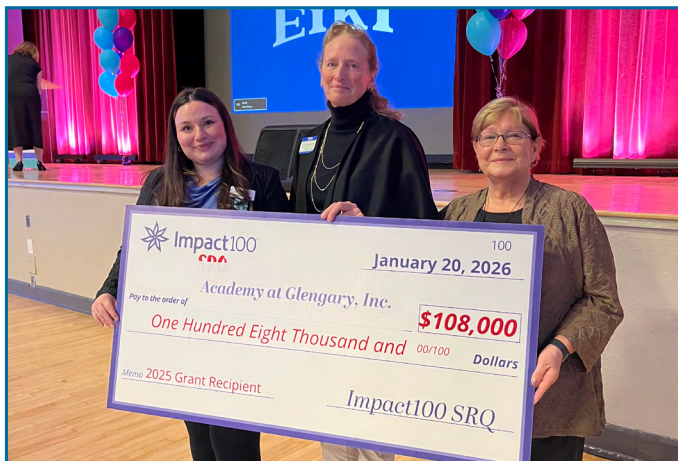


## MAKING AN IMPACT

We are thrilled to announce that Impact100 SRQ selected the Academy for a major grant award! Impact100 SRQ is one of more than sixty chapters worldwide and joins its sister chapters in embracing a local, collective giving model. Founded in 2018, Impact100 SRQ brings together a diverse group of women who fund transformational grants to local nonprofits in both Sarasota and Manatee Counties. After a rigorous selection process, the Academy was selected as one of eight grant recipients.

Our Academy families have often shared their concern for when they are no longer able to provide support to their loved ones (in this case, our Academy members). Funding from Impact100 SRQ will enable us to hire a family care coordinator who will assist our members and families in creating a B.O.S.S. plan, or *Blueprint of Self-Support*, as a tool to navigate long-term financial planning, legal support, trusts, housing and much more.
